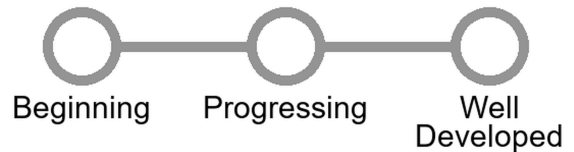

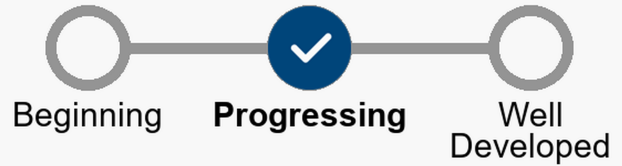

At which level did your child comprehend spoken Spanish in a range of contexts?



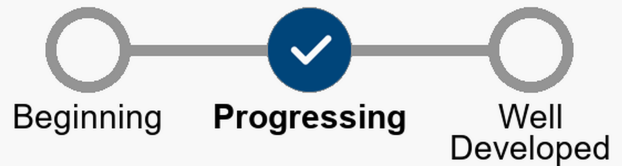
#### Reading

At which level did your child write texts in Spanish to accurately describe and explain ideas?





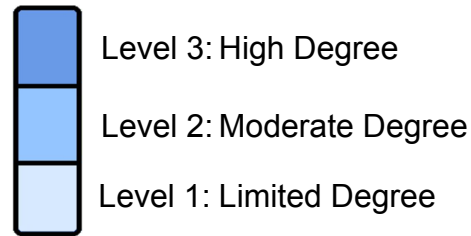

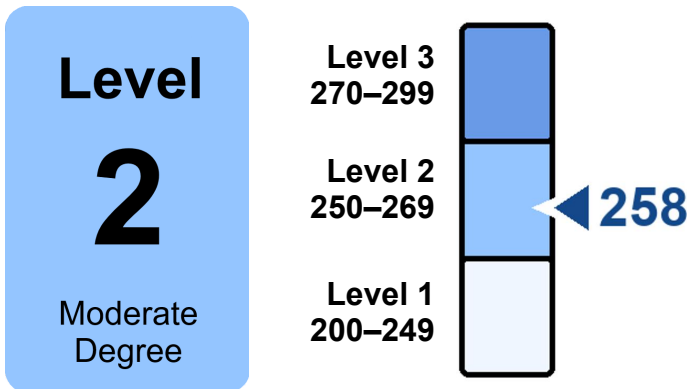

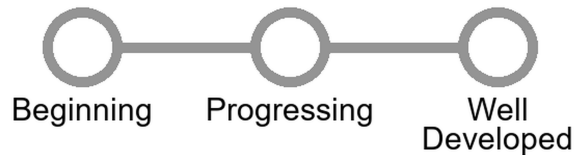

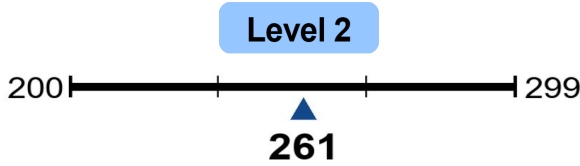

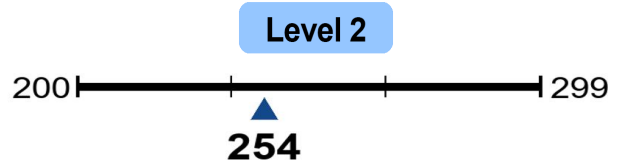

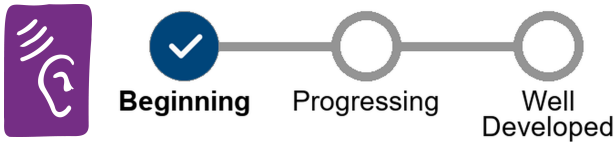
#### Oral Literacy Score



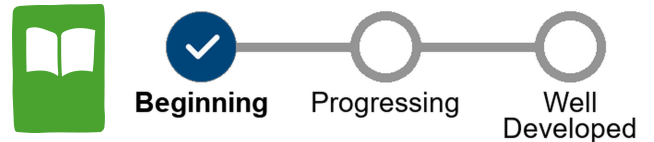
#### Written Literacy Score



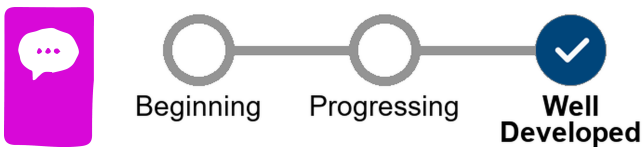
